As we enter the 45th year of Canterbury's storied history, now is the time to look toward the future prosperity of our school. To that effect, the Board of Trustees has worked over the past twelve months to craft a new strategic plan for Canterbury. This work, undertaken in concert with the Head of School, has produced a bold strategic vision for the next five years. The plan provides a pathway for ensuring excellence for our artists, athletes, and scholars by supporting world class faculty, enhancing facilities in the arts, upgrading athletic programs, and working toward balance in student life. Furthermore, the strategic plan places significant emphasis on the financial viability of Canterbury, including mechanisms for enrollment and endowment growth. Finally, the plan will actively engage the strength of the community, both internally and externally, to bring us together as a school and to forge partnerships in the greater Fort Wayne area.

One significant factor in the development of our strategic priorities was a retrospective journey into the school's past history. Canterbury has a "special sauce" that is traced back to the school's founding. The committed nature of our volunteer core of parents, the focus of the students and teachers on robust learning at every level, an athletic program where all students can participate and thrive, a dynamic arts program that starts at the earliest years, and spiritual and character development through our chapel program all provide the recipe for a holistic and humanistic education. That very spirit of our past is reinforced in the future vision of this strategic plan.



Honoring the past

The genesis of Canterbury School can be traced back to a board meeting of the Fort Wayne Philharmonic in the Fall of 1976. There, Anita Cast and Cory Randall had a preliminary conversation about the idea of forming a school. That conversation blossomed into many passionate discussions among the eventual founding families as to the possibilities of what the school could look like. An emphasis on strong academics, a true education in the fine arts, early exposure to the study of foreign language, and a character education program rooted in Christian principles were the key ingredients of Canterbury's founding and long-term success.

When Mick Parrott drafted the first budget for Canterbury, the founding families knew they needed 49 students in the first year in order to make the school viable. When Canterbury opened its doors in Trinity Episcopal Church on September 8th, 1977 it was with 89 first year students.

Building the suture

The strategic plan provides a comprehensive vision for growing the excellence of Canterbury School over the next five years. The first goal of the plan is aimed at enhancing the opportunities for our artists, athletes, and scholars. First and foremost, the plan calls for supporting our teachers as the cornerstone of a lifechanging education. At the heart of Canterbury's mission and success as a school lies the dynamism of our faculty. Goal 1 also calls for enhancing programming and facilities in both the arts and athletics. Canterbury has always been a school that educates the whole person, and support for both arts and athletics will help us to continue this tradition and attract students to our campus. Finally, Goal 1 charges us with the mandate to incorporate more balance and wellness in the lives of our students. As mental health challenges continue to increase among our nation's youth, it is imperative that we devise systems to help our students lead healthier, more balanced lives.

Goal 2 of the plan focuses on the financial sustainability of Canterbury. It sets the ambitious goal of nearly doubling our endowment over the next five years. Historically, schools that thrive have strong endowment support. Working to augment the size of the endowment is of paramount importance to the future success of Canterbury. Goal 2 also identifies one of the most important components of sustainability and prosperity in an independent school environment: enrollment. By recruiting and retaining mission appropriate students, Canterbury will continue to remain one of the best schools in the entire Midwest. The last piece of Goal 2 charges Canterbury to adequately plan for the upkeep of older facilities and the growth of new ones.

Goal 3 of the strategic plan emphasizes the importance of community. It includes the promotion of the things that Canterbury does well ("centers of excellence"), forging partnerships with organizations in the Fort Wayne area, and a directive to create a civic engagement program in the broader community. This goal will also curate an active plan to connect members of the Canterbury family, internally. As we emerge from the pandemic, it is more important than ever to restore the warm and connected community that has made Canterbury School so special over the years.



Goal 1: Ensuring Excellence and Opportunity for Every Artist, Athlete, and Scholar

- Support, empower, recruit, and retain world class educators and support staff who will augment the scholastic growth of our students
- Promote a culture of excellence in the arts across all divisions of the school by offering more exposure to the arts and enhancing our facilities
- Create a robust, developmentally supportive, inclusive, and competitive athletic program which celebrates both contribution and competition in all sports
- Devise a plan to increase balance and wellness in the lives of our students, particularly in respect to their academic, artistic, and athletic pursuits



Goal 2: Growing Canterbury's Future Prosperity and Financial Sustainability

- Grow the endowment to a size of two times our current operating budget
- Fortify enrollment by recruiting and retaining mission appropriate students
- Create financial mechanisms to support the maintenance and upkeep of excellent facilities

Goal 3: Building and Reinforcing the Strength of Canterbury's Community

- Identify, market, and promote Canterbury School's "Centers of Excellence" both internally and externally to the greater Fort Wayne community
- Emphasize relationship building for students, faculty, and staff through cross divisional experiences



- Create purposeful engagement in the Fort Wayne community by developing a strategic civic engagement program for both students and school partnerships
- Establish avenues to strategically solicit ways in which current, new, and past members of the Canterbury community are willing to contribute their time, talent and treasure
- Explore ways to create interaction and connection among all members of the Canterbury community
