2023 Summer Course Guide

With many core curriculum and elective courses to choose from, high school students can bring graduation within reach by completing coursework over the summer.

Canterbury students will earn school credit for completed coursework, and all non-Canterbury students will receive a certificate of completion upon finishing their coursework.

Courses may or may not be transferable to other schools, so guest students should check with their guidance counselors before enrolling in courses.

Canterbury's summer school program is a wonderful way to jump start your high school career!

High School Summer Policies

- The dress code for summer session is relaxed. Shorts and T-shirts are allowed. No offensive or school inappropriate images.
- NEW! Lunch option available- see back.
- Because the summer session is short, regular daily attendance is of great importance. Students missing more than one day or students with chronic tardiness issues will not receive credit for course completion.
- All expectations of proper behavior from the normal school year also apply to summer school. Students may not leave the school without parent permission during summer session. Canterbury reserves the right, in its sole discretion, to withdraw any student from the program at any time for violations of policies and/or inappropriate behavior.
- Courses are designed to give the credit necessary for the High School transcript.
- All classes are held at Canterbury High School, 3210 Smith Road.
- Students should register for classes based on their grade level for the upcoming 2023/24 academic year.

Registration, Tuition, and Refunds

Secure online registration can be completed at **canterburyschool.org/summer**. Because each program has limited capacity, registration is on a first-come, first-served basis. Registration remains open until **May 19**, at which time it will close.

Credit card payments are accepted. Canterbury families may choose to pay via their FACTS plan, and Canterbury faculty may elect to pay via payroll deduction.

Additionally:

- No refunds will be made to a student who, for disciplinary reasons, is asked to leave.
- Tuition monies are non-transferable.
- **The Drop / Add period for Students is May 19.** The Canterbury School Office must be notified in writing prior or full payment will still be due.
- Canterbury School reserves the right to cancel a program if unforeseen circumstances occur. Notification of cancellation of a program will be done as early as possible and pro-rated refunds will be issued.

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Course Descriptions

Grade 9 Physical Education emphasizes the development of lifelong skills and encourages student participation in a wide variety of activities. It may include yoga, weight training, skating, biking, badminton, tennis, bowling, step aerobics, Tae-bo, and Ultimate Frisbee. This class is part of Canterbury's Grade 9 block, which is required for graduation.

Grade 9 Health topics include nutrition; mental, emotional, social, and personal health; disease prevention; chemical substance use and abuse; consumer health; family life and relationships; and accident prevention and safety (including CPR/AED certification). This class is part of Canterbury's Grade 9 block, which is required for graduation.

Grade 9 World Religions is designed to encourage students to learn about different religious viewpoints by studying major religions and religious figures of world religions including, but not limited to, Judaism, Christianity, Islam, Hinduism, and Buddhism. Students will explore how various religions answer fundamental questions of humanity such as origin, meaning of life, morality, and afterlife. This class is part of Canterbury's Grade 9 block, which is required for graduation.

Grade 10 Physical Education allows all students to design their own personal training program, based on their personal interests, in accordance with proper training principles. Cardiovascular endurance and strength training are the two major components of each program. Heart rate monitors are used to help students learn about their own fitness level. This class is part of Canterbury's Grade 10 block, which is required for graduation.

Grade 10 Grammar helps supplement grammar teachings in English classes. It derives nearly all of its material from the text students are reading and the essays and stories they are writing, using all of it to build a foundational understanding of how grammar actually functions in the context of a written work. Students toggle back and forth between identification and writing exercises that are geared towards constructing a relational understanding between words, phrases, and clauses, and they become familiar with the terminology involved in identifying the structures they both identify and construct. Students strive to demonstrate an improved command of their own grammatical styles as well as the rhetorical effects that result from them. This class is part of Canterbury's Grade 10 block, which is required for graduation.

Grade 11 US Government emphasizes the responsibilities and rights of citizenship, the skills necessary for critical thinking, and the knowledge appropriate for wise decision making. In order to accomplish this, students will learn the basics about our system of government – how and why it was designed the way that it is – and then critically evaluate current events/issues within the frameworks that have been established. Topics covered in this course include the media, the Constitution, the Presidency, Congress, the Judiciary, political parties, voting, elections, campaigns, civil liberties, and federalism. Obtaining the baseline set of “facts” is imperative to having productive and stimulating discussions about the readings (some contemporary, others historically significant). This class is required for all Canterbury Juniors.

Grade 11 Economics will cover many topics and concepts related to economics (including macro and micro). The course begins with a brief introduction to the necessary building blocks – supply and demand, opportunity cost, scarcity, etc. The course then moves into discussion and analyses of microeconomics – the study of business decision making, the marketplace, antitrust, monopolies, regulatory practices, etc. Following this, the course will address topics in macroeconomics – inflation, interest rates, gross domestic product, trade, unemployment, budget deficits, etc. The semester will wrap up with an investigation into the global economy where students will evaluate topics including free trade, tariffs, quotas, NAFTA, developing countries, etc. Throughout the course, there will be an emphasis on relating the economic concepts to current events. A key goal of this course is to improve decision making skills and to better understand the economic implications of policymakers’ decisions.

NEW! Lunch

Quest, who provides our school lunches throughout the academic year, is offering the option to purchase lunch and snacks to students. For an additional \$100, students will be able to get a lunch, as well as a snack during the morning break period between classes.

Students who do not purchase a lunch option can bring their own lunch, but cannot purchase a lunch unless it was purchased during registration.

SAT Prep Math/English will help prepare students with a better understanding of how to take the SAT and be successful in your approach. Students both familiar and unfamiliar will benefit from this course.

Summer in the City: A New York Musical and Theatrical Immersion is a hybrid lecture / discussion and immersion experience. Students will explore the history of musical theatre and the role New York City has played in the development of the art form. Research into productions, venues and history of New York City as a place for artists and performers to leave their mark. Students will attend performances and workshops. Written journals and a final essay reflecting on the experience will be required.

Chess players are invited to learn from Lead instructor and FIDE Master Jim Dean, a 4-time Indiana State Chess Champion! All aspects of the game will be covered and all equipment provided. Students will be instructed based on their ability and skill level and receive confirmation of which group they will be with before camp begins.

Chemistry Warm-Up will provide you with a basic understanding of the world of Chemistry as you prepare for the upcoming school year and the challenges of this class.

Algebra Warm-Up will provide you with a basic understanding of the expectations of your upcoming HS Algebra course and introduce you to its concepts.

French/Spanish Warm-Up will prepare you to get back in the swing of things. We'll work on reintroduction of the language and prep you for the upcoming school year!
